A message from Fr. Dominic



In St. Matthew's Gospel, Jesus gave us the parable of the sower who scattered seeds around, with the yield depending on the type of soil.

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I knew Fr. Dehon

Over the past few years, this space has been dedicated to letters I have received from our benefactors. In this issue, I wanted to tell you about the joyful surprise we received some years ago when we discovered one of our dear friends actually knew the Venerable Fr. Leo John Dehon, the founder of our Congregation.

Before Marie-Louise passed away in 2008 at the age of 93, she had been in constant contact with the Priests of the Sacred Heart. She had lost her husband (he died at the age of 90) and asked for prayers for her health. Imagine how surprised I was when she wrote to Fr. Paul:

"I was born in Belgium. It is a small country, and we knew Fr. Dehon." She recalled that Father "came to Mass to sing with the coal miners. They all had very good voices." The headquarters of the Priests of the Sacred Heart was in Brussels, Belgium, before they were moved to Rome. Fr. Dehon died there on August 12, 1925.

Marie-Louise noted that her mother's nurse had served in Kinshasa, a town in what was once known as the Belgian Congo and is now the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Fr. Dehon sent the first missionaries to that part of the Congo in 1897.

Marie-Louise was inspired by the Catholic faith of the Congolese people and moved by their poverty, especially the elderly who were often neglected. She often sent donations to be used by our missionaries there.

I am mindful of Marie-Louise these days as I read reports of the violence and war which afflict the Congolese people today. Fr. Silvano, SCJ, a missionary from the Congo, once shared the horrors of what the Congolese people have been going through. The economy has collapsed, communication and travel are difficult, and there is an extreme health crisis.

"Hunger, dirt and even death — these are awful," said Fr. Silvano. "But they are nothing compared to seeing people lose hope, lose their dignity, lose their will to live. The population lives at an unbearable level of misery and suffering."

However, there are rays of hope. The Church has a strong presence in the Congo where we were proud to have celebrated 100 years of hope in 2022.

Marie-Louise wanted to make certain she could leave a legacy of this work and listed the Priests of the Sacred Heart with a bequest at her passing.

Thanks to Marie-Louise and her support, our SCJ missionaries continue to fulfill the dream of Fr. Dehon "to bring the love of the Divine Heart to such pagan lands as the Holy See may entrust to us."

PRIESTS OF THE SACRED HEART

On March 25, 1923, Fr. Mathias Fohrman, SCJ, celebrated Mass at St. Mary's Church in Lower Brule, SD. Although Fr. Mathias had been in the United States since 1919 on a fundraising mission for the German Province, it was not until that first Mass that the Priests of the Sacred Heart (Dehonians) had officially begun their commitment to serve in the U.S.

In 2023 — 100 years later — that ministry extends from South Dakota to Wisconsin, Mississippi, Texas and Florida, reaching across ethnic, social and economic lines.

In Houston, TX, the Priests of the Sacred Heart are in the central city parish of Our Lady of Guadalupe, one of the oldest Hispanic parishes in Texas.

In Mississippi, Dehonians are responsible for the Church's ministry in five northwestern counties of the state. Through Sacred Heart Southern Missions (SHSM), Dehonians offer social services and emergency aid, advocacy, housing, education, job training and counseling. The Sacred Heart Auto League, which promotes safe, prayerful driving, is also a part of SHSM's ministry.

Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology in Hales Corners, WI, prepares men from around the country — and the world — for ordained ministry. It also offers master's programs for lay students, and an internationally regarded English and Cultural Studies (ECS) program specifically designed for those in, or preparing for ministry in the Church.

Milwaukee. Just a few miles away, Dehonians operate Sacred Heart at Monastery Lake, a senior apartment community with several units reserved for those who are economically challenged.

One of our oldest ministries in the United States is St. Joseph's Indian School in Chamberlain, SD. Since it first opened its doors in 1927, the school has expanded its outreach well beyond the classroom with family counseling, healthcare, social programs and education in Lakota (Sioux) traditions. Dehonians also continue to minister in reservation parishes on the Lower Brule and Crow Creek Reservations.

And just as the Dehonian presence in the United States was begun by missionary outreach, the U.S. Province is committed to building the Church by supporting missions throughout the world including Vietnam, India, the Philippines, South Africa, DR Congo and Indonesia.

Dehonians, Priests of the Sacred Heart, SCJs — several names for a religious community of priests and brothers with a single mission: bringing the love of the Sacred Heart to those in the greatest of need.

Roxanne has been a supporter of the Priests of the Sacred Heart for over 15 years and is also a member of the Good Steward Society. After many conversations with Roxanne over the years, we had the pleasure of visiting her at her home and sharing a meal together.

It was at this visit Roxanne shared that she did not grow up Catholic. She said, "I recall that one Christmas, while watching TV as I played, I saw a Mass come on and said to myself, 'I am going to do that one day!'"

And she did on April 30, 1989 with the help of the late Fr. Bob Scott, CSP, and Karen Love, her college friend, sorority sister, mentor and Rites of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) sponsor, who has been a pillar of faith to her to this day.

"Thirty-five years ago, while I was in college, I heard an unexpected message during my prayer time: 'Wherever I am, my mother will be.' I was an International Studies major, and I knew, as all overly confident college kids do, that I would take the world by storm and work a series of diplomatic jobs around the world. In thanksgiving for all my mother did for me, I would take care of her, she would never be alone, and we would travel, making countless memories together. My youthful hubris was tempered with a string of

humbling failures that redirected my aspirations, yet still I knew wherever I am, my mother will be," shared Roxanne.

Following her faith discovery, Roxanne's mother one day surprised her by asking to attend Mass with her. Soon after, she entered RCIA with Roxanne as her sponsor. She was confirmed April 22, 2000.

Roxanne continues, "In the fullness of time, the unfolding of this parable deepened my contemplation of Christ's Passion, and its beauty assumed center stage in my life. En route to the kingdom of heaven, the resplendence of the Cross resided in the honor I was given to care for my mother who had Alzheimer's disease. While there were light-hearted moments, this disease was unrelenting. As I journeyed alongside her, I recalled another Way of the Cross in which Simon of Cyrene helped Our Lord on His ascent to Golgotha where He was crucified. In my mother's struggle and faltering memory, I glimpsed Our Lord.

"I did not believe I was worthy to behold Him in her suffering, yet I was captivated by His beauty in her during that most difficult time.

"The pearl of great price came to us both, and on May 5, 2018, led Mom home to heaven."

A Life-long Commitment as a Dehonian

Frater Paul Phong Hoang, SCJ, makes perpetual profession

On May 11, Frater Paul Phong Hoang, SCJ, made his perpetual profession of vows with the Priests of the Sacred Heart (Dehonians). The ceremony took place at Sacred Heart Monastery/Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology. Fr. Vien Nguyen, SCJ, provincial superior, received Frater Paul's vows. Fr. John Czyzynski, SCJ, was Fra. Paul's final yows director.

Fra. Paul, who turned 31 just two days before his perpetual profession, is originally from Ha Tien, Kien Giang, Vietnam. "It is a culturally diverse town of Cambodian, Chinese, and Vietnamese heritage," he said. "Looking back, going from where I was to where I am now is nothing short of a miracle. I believe that God had a plan for me and was involved throughout my journey. I am forever grateful for the SCJs and our culturally diverse community."

Fra. Paul's family immigrated to the United States in 2007 and settled in Houston, Texas. Before following his vocation to religious life, he earned a bachelor's degree in biology from the University of Houston. Fra. Paul learned about the Dehonians through a member of his family and spent time learning about the community through Come and See weekends.

"I was attracted to the SCJs' simplicity, diversity and community life," he said. Fra. Paul professed his first vows in 2018. He did his pastoral year in Lower Brule, SD, and has been involved in a variety of other province ministries. Fra. Paul is scheduled to complete his M.Div. at Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology in December, 2023.

"My journey of faith is an existential one," said Fra. Paul. "I was haunted by the idea of God and attracted to the love of Christ.

"Psalms 139 says: 'Where can I go from your spirit? Or where can I flee from your presence ... even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast.'"

Fra. Paul continues, saying that he "was closer to Buddhism and ancestor veneration in my youth back in Vietnam. Before seminary, I experimented with a few different Christian denominations. Captivated by philosophy, at some point, I wanted to be the master of my own ethics, God was an obstacle to my false conception of freedom. But in the end, I realize that only Christ is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

"The confession of St. Peter rang loud and clear whenever I thought of leaving the seminary, 'Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life' (John 6:68).

"I've found my life's meaning ultimately in Christ, in service, and self-denial. I want to live these principles through the Dehonian charism and way of life. This is why I requested to make final vows."
